#### About the exhibition

This exhibition is drawn from a recent gift of works on paper to the museum from the Leon Polk Smith Foundation. A native of Oklahoma, Leon Polk Smith (1906-1996) moved to New York in 1945 where he pioneered a style of geometric abstraction that laid the foundation for Minimalism in the 1960s. Better known for his paintings, Smith created approximately 2,000 unique works on paper throughout his career. Their sheer number testifies to their significance to him.

# **Discussion Questions and Lesson Plans**

#### DUSTY MILLER

Lesson plan: Discuss the works depicted on the page. Ask the students what they see. Ask follow-up questions. Have students explore abstraction by sketching something and simplifying it in a variety of ways. Try only drawing the outline of the object/animal/person/etc. Try sketching the object lightly and then creating large shapes over the lighter drawing to explore simplification of the form.

What do you see in the images below? Do they remind you of anything?







This plant is called "dusty miller." Like many artists who work with abstraction and minimalism, Leon Polk Smith looked to nature for inspiration. Can you see a resemblance between this plant and his designs, both titled "Dusty Miller," below. How are they similar? How are they different? How might you take Smith's designs even further?

#### ANAGRAMS

An anagram is word, phrase, or name formed by rearranging the letters of another, such as *cinema* and *iceman*. Rearrange the shapes in Leon Polk Smith's **compositions** to create new compositions. The works depicted below are untitled, so create a title for your new composition. Can you rearrange the shapes again? Try using the title you gave your last composition as an anagram for the title of your next one! How many compositions and titles can you make using the same shapes?
