Professor Deer's scholarship focuses on the intersection of tribal law and victim's rights. She is the author of *Beginning and End of Rape: Confronting Sexual Violence in Native America*, which received the 8th Annual Labriola Center American Indian National Book Award among others. Additionally, she has co-authored many textbooks on tribal law. This year, Professor Deer received the Spirit of Excellence Award from the American Bar Association and was granted the Langston Hughes Fellowship at the University of Kansas. Deer regularly contributes as a writer and researcher with non-profit advocacy groups including Amnesty International and the Minnesota Indian Women's Sexual Assault Coalition. She has also been quoted in the New York Times and appeared as a guest on NPR, Al Jazeera, and MSNBC.
